Parents as Advocates: Family Engagement in Schools

WHAT IS FAMILY ENGAGEMENT IN SCHOOLS?

Family engagement in schools is defined as parents and school personnel working together at the classroom, local, and system level to support and improve the learning, development, and health of children and adolescents.

Family engagement in schools is a shared responsibility in which schools and other community agencies and organizations are committed to reaching out to engage parents in meaningful ways, and the parents are committed to actively supporting their children's and adolescents' learning and development.¹

Why is Family Engagement Important?

Family Engagement leads to:

- Higher grades and test scores;
- Better attendance:
- More classes passed and credits earned;
- Improved behavior at home and at school;
- Better social skills and adaptation to school.
- Increased participation in more challenging academic programs.

 - Share what you know.
 - Take an active role in the development of your child's educational services.
 - Engage your child by helping him/her participate as much as possible in any conversation regarding his/her education. (Self Determination)

• Build and Maintain Relationships with Your Child's Educational Team:

- o Don't hesitate to ask questions.
- Address issues/concerns as they arise.

- Check the facts and/or ask for clarification before reacting.
- Be consistent and follow through.
